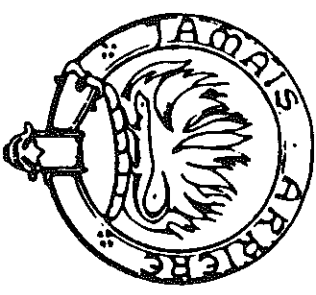

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

To our Patron, Sir Sholto Douglas Kt., guest speaker Capt. Graham Jardine-Vidgen, representing the Clan Jardine in Queensland, members of Clan Douglas, Clans Congress of Queensland and guests; welcome to our 6th Annual General Meeting. We also extend greetings to our members and associates who are unable to be with us on this important day.

As I compose this report, having just returned from a memorable trip overseas with my wife, Merle, and in particular the land of our forebears, I am finding it difficult to adjust to the land of sunshine in lieu of the land of mists, which I will comment on elsewhere.

We commenced the financial year with a committee made up of most of the usual stalwarts, with two members taking new executive positions, namely, David Roseby to Vice President, Dawn Roseby to Treasurer, while Ian Douglas moved from Vice President to a new portfolio of Membership Secretary.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS: The committee, in its usual harmonious fashion, has steered our association successfully through the year, and I must report that we are in a sound situation, both financially and numerically. During the year, our Vice President David Roseby brought to our attention that because our numbers had dropped, mostly because of lack of renewals, our outgoings were higher than our returns. We immediately put a promotion campaign into operation, and it was quite successful, but it has made us aware how much we depend on our members annual renewals to keep us viable. I do not wish to single out anyone in particular who has given outstanding service to our association, as I would have to name everyone, but if you look around you, they are all here to-day, with the exception of our overseas correspondents.

I hope our members find the Newsletters as interesting as I do, with the varied contributions coming in from our members, containing stories of Douglas history, prominent Douglas personalities and family histories. This is our way of participating in our Society, regardless of distance.

Thanks to our Vice President David Roseby, for so ably standing in for me during my absence overseas during the August committee meeting, and also writing the message for Newsletter No.22. You have done a sterling job, and I could have stayed away longer to give you the opportunity to write more contributions to our Newsletter.

DOUGLAS HISTORY BOOK: The book on the History of the Douglasses is still at a stalemate, as the Publisher is not prepared to proceed until more orders are forthcoming. The last word we had on it was the letter from Aberdeen University Press, which we produced for you in Newsletter No. 20. We really do need a benefactor to help bring this to fruition.

FUNCTIONS: I attended the annual Kirling of the Tartan, hosted by the Clans Congress of Queensland, held this time at St. Andrews Church, Creek and Ann Streets, Brisbane, followed by luncheon at the home of Clan Campbell Secretary, Trevor Campbell. It was a very pleasant occasion, and I urge more members to

Join me this year, on 29th November at St. Pauls Presbyterian Church, St. Pauls Terrace, Brisbane, at 9.30 am.

The Annual Toowoomba Caledonian Society Highland Debutante Ball was pleased to have as its official guest for the evening, the Chief of the Clan Nichol Society, The Much Honoured Iain Macneacail of Macnicol and Scorrybreac, and his wife Pamela. He is one of the few Scottish Chiefs who reside in Australia, and there was a large following of members of the Clans Congress of Queensland who attended the Ball in his honour.

We had another successful Annual Picnic at our home on April 11th. There was a good attendance, with members such as Gary and June Marks, our Sydney Convenor, in attendance. It was a wonderful opportunity for our committee and members to meet them, as they look after our interests in Sydney, particularly the Scottish Australian Heritage Council's annual gathering, where last year Archibald Douglas just happened to stumble on to the gathering, He was visiting from overseas, and is related to John Douglas, Earl of Morton.

DOUGLAS TARTAN: We were instrumental in having a run of Douglas of Drumlanrig Grey tartan, in lightweight wool, produced. It had originally been produced solely for Fletcher Jones products, and has not been available for 2 years. If any members are interested in acquiring some of this very smart looking fabric, orders could be sent to us, and we will arrange delivery by the metre.


KINDRED SOCIETIES: As can be seen, we have good rapport with other societies, including our counterpart in the U.S.A., the Clan Douglas Society of North America, the Clans Congress of Queensland, Scottish Australian Heritage Council in Sydney, and of course the Brisbane Caledonian Society, where we hold our committee meetings. We extend our thanks to the latter, for this very central venue.

DOUGLAS CHIEFSHIP: This matter is still very much in the air, but on my visit to the U.K. I called on many contacts, such as Arthur Douglas, M.L.J., F.S.A.(Scot.) of Essex, Norman Douglas of Dundarroch, John Douglas, the Earl of Morton, and Alastair Campbell of Airds, of the Lyon Court. I was received and entertained most graciously by all of these gentlemen, and we had some in depth discussions re the Chiefship and it is a very complicated issue, but some recommendations were offered as to a future line of approach in the matter. I hope progress will be made during the following year.

THANKS: Once again we extend our sincere thanks to Ken Waller, Principal of Moreton Bay College, and husband of our member Jan, for the use of the College Music Room for our Annual General Meeting. It is a wonderful venue in a delightful garden setting, which adds so much to the comfort of our members on this special day. I would ask members to show their appreciation by acclamation.

Mr. Chairman, members and visitors - It is with pleasure that I present the Sixth Annual Treasurer's Report of the Clan Douglas Association of Australia.

Overall, membership has remained more or less static during the past year. When compared with last year's membership of 183, the current detailed membership is as follows:

Whilst we have a new membership number of 30, there has been a corresponding loss of membership of 29 due in part to the current economic climate and lost contact through change of address etc. An aggressive membership drive was launched during the year, through the medium of Australia wide local and suburban newspapers and the Australian Womens Weekly. It is encouraging to note new memberships are being registered as well as numerous inquiries.

A permanent membership register was established during the year to correlate the various types of membership and to accurately and readily define the financial status of each member. The system had to differentiate between life members, bi-annual members, annual members and five year members, as well as memberships paid in arrears. This has been achieved by the register as well as maintaining current addresses.

The Clan's fixed deposit with the Metway Bank has grown to \$3,946.49, an increase of \$312.22.

May I express my appreciation to the Committee and members for their support and advice during the past year and I extend my best wishes to the incoming committee and the Clan's continued success in the forthcoming year.

If help is required tracing your ancestors, please send me all the information that is available. A self addressed envelope would be appreciated. We have quite a few new members since initiating a membership drive in July, but so far I haven't been sent many family history pedigree charts. If you haven't received a chart to fill in or have lost your chart, would you please advise me so that I can rectify the matter.

C.D.A.A. 6th A.G.M. - Newsletter Editor's Report

Saturday, October 10, 1992.

Mr. Chairman, Members of Clan Douglas Association and guests,

It gives me great pleasure to be able to present my 6th annual report to you.

Every quarter-year the newsletter is printed and then despatched by Australia Post to over 200 members in Scotland, England, U.S.A., New Zealand and Brunei, and all over Australia. The cost of printing and postage has risen and the newsletter now costs approx. \$2.45 each to print and post. As our membership is still \$10 per annum, members are getting very good value for money and C.D.D.A.A is only getting 20 cents per member per annum for our administration costs. Our own costs are still defrayed by voluntary help from the hands of members who meet regularly every 3 months at my house to package, label, and sort the newsletters. These working bee days also give us a chance to exchange C.D.D.A.A. news and are most enjoyable. My thanks goes once more to this loyal band of helpers.

I thank the members for the interesting contributions to the newsletter - please keep sending them in - and for those members in far away places, we'd like you to share news of special family events or local interest with us too. Remember the newsletter is our main source of information and the 'life blood' of our association. New members' contributions are very welcome, being 'new' does not eliminate you from sending 'contributions to the newsletter'. Back issues are on sale from the Secretary and I encourage everybody to collect all 23 issues.

I'd like to finish my report by thanking the executive committee and members for your support and encouragement throughout the year.

Benjamin Douglass trade unionist, was born on 21 March 1830 at Greenwich, Kent, England, son of John Douglass, a Quaker and Chartist. As an apprentice plumber he married Mary Stacy at Wokingham, Berkshire. In January 1855, described as a bricklayer, he arrived at Portland in the Shand; next month he went to Melbourne where he at once became involved in trade union and radical activity, particularly the agitation for the eight-hour day, in which he was prominent for thirty years. In 1856 he became the first president of the Operative Plasterers' Society and a member of the first eight-hour committee which successfully gained the concession for some building trades workers on 21 March. Douglass was convinced of the need for continued union organisation and in 1857 was one of the prime movers in the United Trades Association, which became the Trades Hall and Literary Institute Committee. He also saw the need for unskilled workers to belong to the union movement and helped to form an Organisation of Labourers and in 1859, with C.J. Donlg.v.J, the short-lived Political and Social Labour League.

By 1860 Douglass was one of the out-standing trade-union leaders of Victoria. He had helped to clarify conditions in industries where subcontracting applied. In the 1860s his industrial work led him into political action to seek protection for local industries. In 1865 he was chairman of the Central Protection Committee and of Graham Berry's [q.v.] election committee, and in 1870 his prominence was recognised in his election as president of the Victorian Industries Protection League. In 1871 he was defeated at Collingwood in the general election. In 1872 he became secretary of the Australian Democratic Association in support of the Duffy [q.v.] ministry. He moved to Warrnambool where in 1874 he became secretary of a coal-mining company, helped to establish the Artisans' School of Design and became a member of the borough council.

Returning to Melbourne, Douglass became a clerk of works in the public service in 1881 and later an inspector; in 1884 he supervised the building of the law courts. In 1882 he had become a council member of the Working Men's College and was its vice-president until 1885. He was president of the Trades Hall Council in 1884-86 and chaired the 1884 Intercolonial Trades Union Congress. His increasing conservatism was reflected in his leadership of the trustees of the Trades Hall in the bitter struggle for control with affiliated unions in 1884-87. By the late 1890s he was opposed to strike action, although he had been prominent in the 1890 maritime strike and had encouraged George Higinbotham [q.v.] to donate strike funds. Douglass was one of the two mourners who accompanied the family when Higinbotham was buried in 1892. Douglass remained active in community affairs until his death on 4 February 1904. He was buried in the Melbourne general cemetery, survived by five of his eight children.

For more than fifty years Douglass played a significant role in Victorian industrial history. His responsible co-operation with employers indicated the effects of protection in the colony and conditioned his drift away from the radical phase of his early career. On his death N. Levi [q.v.] of the Chamber of Manufactures commented that 'the men who were mixed up with the eight-hours movement in the early days were different to what they are now'.

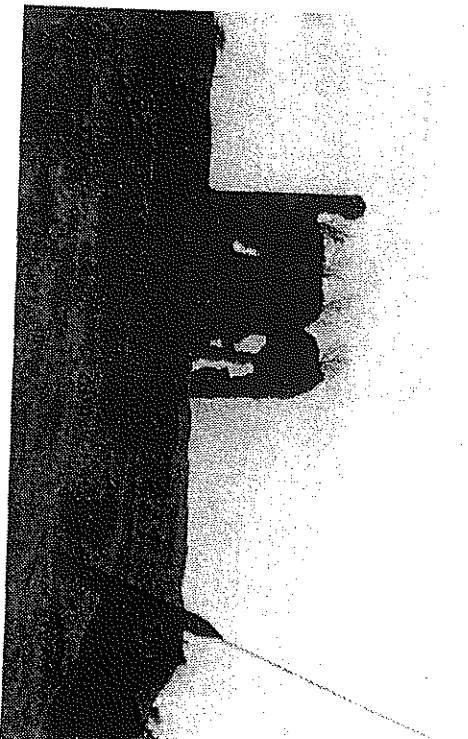

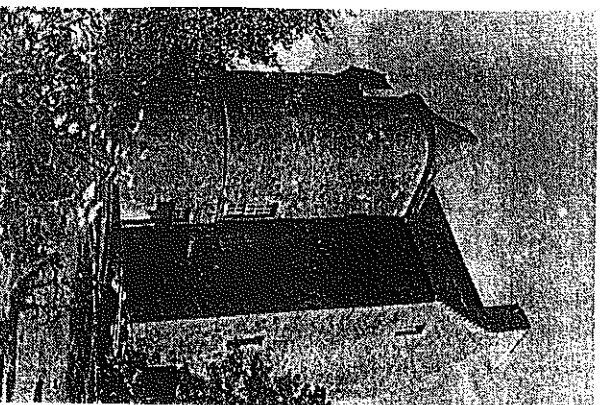

What's like us? Damn few and they're all a'deidi!

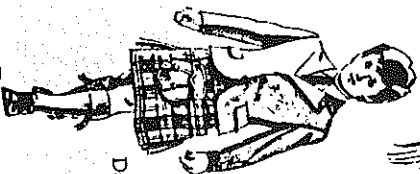

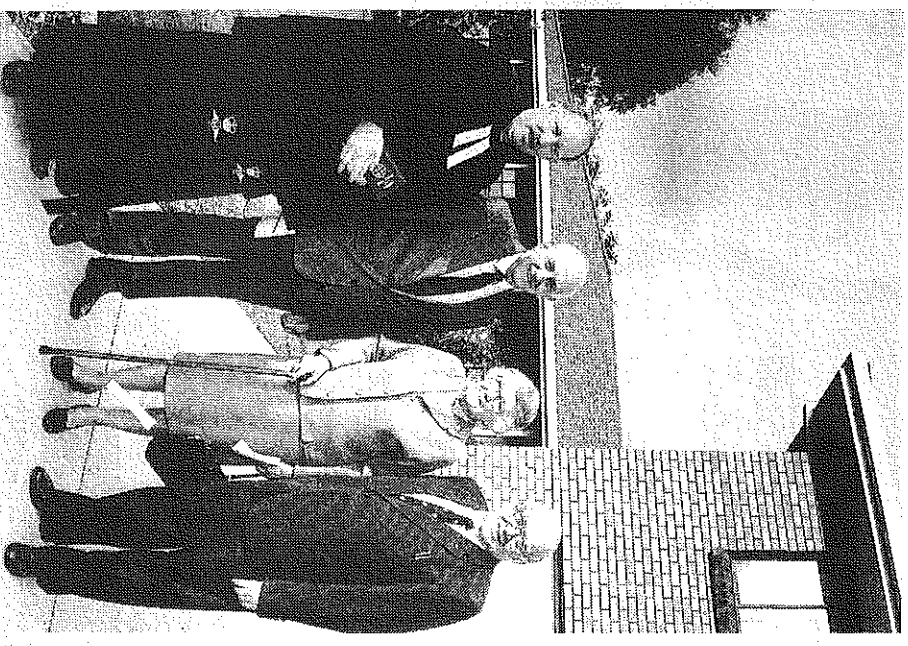

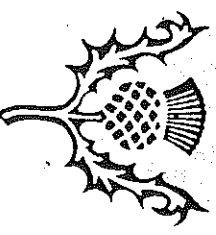
RECIPES FROM SCOTLAND

Some Scottish Culinary Terms - Bap - The traditional breakfast roll of Scotland, oval shaped, with a dent in the centre.

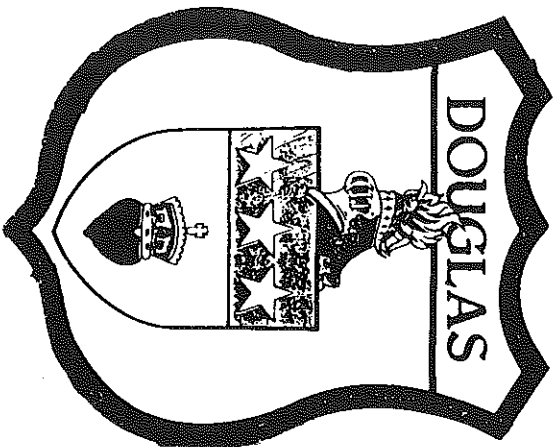

BAPS

1 lb. flour	1 teaspoon sugar
2 ozs. lard	1 Sm. " salt
1 oz. yeast	$\frac{1}{2}$ pint milk & water.

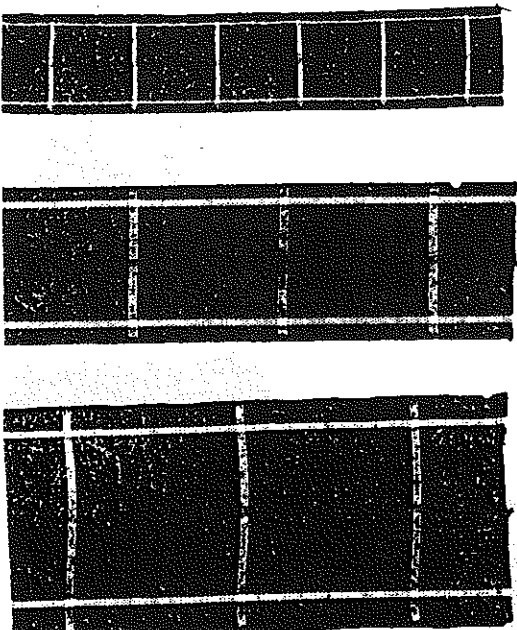


Sift flour into warm bowl and mix in the salt. Rub the lard in thoroughly with the finger tips. In another bowl cream the yeast and sugar(work together with wooden spoon till liquid); make the milk & water tepid and add to the yeast; strain into the flour. Make into a soft dough, cover, and set to rise for an hour in a warm place. Knead lightly, divide into pieces of equal size and form into shapes about three inches long and two wide. Brush with milk or water(to give a glaze), and if "floury baps" are desired, dust them with flour just before brushing them and again just before they go into the oven. Place the baps on a greased and floured tin and set again in a warm place for fifteen minutes. To prevent blisters press a finger into the centre of each before they go into the oven. Bake in a hot oven for fifteen to twenty minutes. Baps appear exclusively on the breakfast table and should be eaten warm.
